After checking your manuscript, it has come to our attention that it does not comply with our Code and Data Policy.

You have archived your code in GitHub. However, GitHub is not a suitable repository.

GitHub itself instructs authors to use other alternatives for long-term archival and publishing, such as Zenodo. Therefore, please, publish your code in one of the appropriate repositories.

In this way, before the Discussions stage is closed, you must reply to this comment with the link to the repository for the code and the corresponding DOI.

Also, you must include in a potential reviewed version of your manuscript the modified 'Code and Data Availability' section and the DOI of the code. Also, in the GitHub repository, there is no license listed. If you do not include a license, the code continues to be your property and can not be used by others. Therefore, when uploading the model's code to Zenodo, you could want to choose a free software/open-source (FLOSS) license. We recommend the GPLv3. You only need to include the file '<https://www.gnu.org/licenses/gpl-3.0.txt>' as LICENSE.txt with your code. Also, you can choose other options that Zenodo provides: GPLv2, Apache License, MIT License, etc.
